This year our Lenten series will envelop our time together in worship. We will be taking part in a series titled "Everything in Between". On Sundays it will be reflected in our liturgy and on Wednesday evenings we will take time to reflect on artwork in the midst of Holden Evening Prayer. For more details on this series, see page 3.

See how Rev. Lisle Gwynn Garrity, Founder and Creative Director of *A Sanctified Art* introduces this series:

You may notice that this series includes many parables, one of Jesus' favorite teaching tools. I have always loved parables because they root our faith in storytelling and metaphor. However, while working on this series, I have to admit that I sympathize with the frustration and confusion Jesus' original listeners must have felt when they asked him a pointed question and he replied with a parable instead. We so deeply long for definition, right or wrong, this or that. We want straightforward answers, but that's not exactly what Jesus gave us. Stories inherently hold nuance, complexity, and multiple layers of meaning—just like our lives do. And so, when I find myself grasping for clean-cut binaries and easy answers, I will look for the ways God might meet me in the spectrum in between. I will look for the promise that Jesus' parables hold: there is good news that exists beyond my linear, one-track mind.

Friday & Saturday March 28 & 29, 2025



Friday, March 28 from 5:45-7:30pm


Connections shelter is a low barrier emergency shelter in Mankato. They house men, women, and families. They have a 45 bed capacity. Every night, a meal is provided by members of the community for all guests and staff. Sign up on the Happenings Board to serve this amazing ministry!

Connections also operates a Drop-in Center Monday through Friday from 10am to 3pm. The drop-in center helps those in need by providing CE assessments, referrals, computer access and WiFi, a phone line, snacks and frozen meals, toiletries, and a resource board.

Connections Ministry began as a coalition of downtown churches in Mankato, coming together to best serve those in the community seeking assistance and resources.

Grief is one of the most universal human experiences, and yet it taking away grief, but by being with us in it. remains one of the hardest to put into words. It comes in many 4.
